? DID YOU KNOW?

- Earth Day is 22nd April.

- Around 1 billion people take part in Earth Day activities each year, from across 190 countries.






A multiple choice quiz aimed at helping children to explore just how precious our Earth is and the impact humans are having on it.



GET INVOLVED: PROTECTING OUR WORLD PLANET EARTH FC

Protecting Earth is going to involve us all. Bring together your dream team as you create a football team destined to win something far greater than the World Cup – the future of the planet itself!

Design 'Planet Earth FC's' Football Kit: If the team is going to battle to save the future of the planet, then it better look good doing it! Design the perfect football kit for 'Planet Earth FC' to play in.

Planet Earth FC Team: Planet Earth FC needs 11 of the best players to be successful in saving the planet. For each of the 11 'players' children should come up with an act they can do to help make a difference. This might be cycling more, recycling, eating less meat, showering for less time, turning the tap off when brushing teeth, wearing a jumper instead of turning the heating on etc.

Afterwards let children share their 11 acts. Encourage them to take their sheets home to help remind them of the promises they have made to help make a difference and do their part to help 'Planet Earth FC' to victory.



GET CREATIVE: IN THE KITCHEN **EARTH BISCUITS**

Bake some tasty biscuits designed to look just like our green and blue planet, Earth. The below recipe makes 12 biscuits.

- In a bowl beat together the butter, sugar and vanilla until the mixture is pale and fluffy. Add the egg and beat again.
- Tip in the flour and bicarb and mix together.
- Split the mixture into two bowls. In one bowl add the blue colouring and in the other bowl add the green. Mix well until the dough in each bowl is evenly coloured.
- Pull out pieces from each coloured mixture and start shaping into small balls, patching if necessary to create an Earth effect.
- Place the balls onto a lined baking tray, leaving plenty of space between each one. You may need to use multiple baking trays or cook them in batches.
- Bake for 15-18 minutes at 190c / 170c Fan / Gas 5. Place on a wire rack to cool before eating.



GET INVOLVED: PROTECTING OUR WORLD EARTH SEED BOMBS

Create some seed bombs made to look like the Earth, to help grow flowers – perfect to increase biodiversity and fill the world with colour.

- Cut green, blue and white construction paper into squares of roughly 2-3cm each. Place each colour in separate bowls.
- Fill each bowl with water so the paper is fully covered and leave to soak for 20 minutes. (Do these first two stages at the beginning of the session, complete a different activity whilst the soaking takes place and then come back to it later on).
- Remove the paper from the bowl and squeeze the excess water out of the paper. Now place the paper in the food processor / blender and pulse until the paper becomes pulp. (Note: This stage will require additional leader support and supervision)

What you'll need:

- Construction Paper
- Bowls
- Water
- Food Blender / Processor
- · Wild Flower Seeds
- Remove from the blender and put the pulp back into an empty bowl. Repeat this process for all three colours, keeping the colours separate throughout.
- Open the packet of seeds and add seeds to each of the bowls. Gently mix them into the pulp.
- Take a bit of each coloured pulp and form it into a ball. You want to try and make the ball look like Earth, so try not to mix the colours up too much.
- Place the balls onto a paper plate and leave them to dry. You could press some more seeds into the ball(s) if you think they need some more.
- Ask children to take their seed bombs home and leave them to dry overnight, before throwing them into a flower bed or plant pot at home. Make sure to add plenty of water to the bomb when it comes to planting them.

GET ACTIVE: PLAYING GAMES PROTECT THE EARTH

A game designed to highlight all the different ways we cause damage to our world and how it is our job to protect it.

- At one end of the room place 6 skittles (or 2L plastic bottles, with a bit of water inside to add weight).

 These skittles represent the Earth.
- 2 1 or 2 children should be nominated to be Earth's protectors. They should stand near the skittles. Everyone else should stand at the other end of the meeting space.
- 3 Explain that Earth's protectors must try and stop the pins from falling over, by blocking anything that is thrown at them. The rest of the group have the job of throwing sponge balls at the pins, trying to knock them over.
- 4 Before starting the game, ask the group to suggest ideas for what each of the balls could represent. For example, if you have 6 balls then the group will need to think of 6 different ways we harm the planet. This might include dropping litter, not recycling, driving to school instead of walking, not turning lights off after using them, using single use plastics etc. Only once the group have come up with 6 different ideas, can then 'earn' all 6 balls for the game.
- Play the game and time how long Earth's protectors can keep all the pins standing for. After all the pins have fallen, nominate 1 or 2 new children to be the new protectors and reset the game. Make sure to ask the group for 6 new ways we harm the planet before each round.
- 6 The protectors who keep the pins (Earth) standing for the longest period of time win.

Top Tip: Have some leaders stood behind the pins to throw the balls back to the group, so they have a continuous supply of balls to be throwing at the pins (Earth).



GET INTO THE BIBLE: PRAYER A WORLD FULL OF THANKS

Earth Day is about celebrating the wonderful planet we live on. Spend some time giving thanks to God for all he has given us. Have an inflatable globe, a large picture of Earth or something similar to help focus the prayers.

- Explain to the group that they are going to spend a short while reflecting on all the good things about Earth. This can include anything the group love about Earth from our incredible animals, beautiful scenery, favourite places, water that keeps us alive, our homes that keep us safe and so on. Encourage the group to list as many things as possible.
- 2 Ideally you should write these things onto an inflatable globe or a large picture of the Earth. Keep going until the globe / picture is covered with things the group are thankful for.
- Remind the group that everything on the earth has been created and gifted to us by God. Whilst it can be really easy for us to take it for granted, we all need to remember to be thankful to God for what he has given us and to look after it as best we can.
- Finish in prayer, thanking God for all the things the group are thankful for about Earth, as well as asking God to help us to look after his creation too.




